History

The teaching and learning of History at Royd is through a topic based approach enabling children to explore different periods of time. History should not just be about learning specific dates and times.

Here at Royd, the children are encouraged to experience History through hands on learning, e.g. using real artefacts and participating in educational visits. Our children have enjoyed fantastic visits including trips to Warwick Castle and 'The Victorian Classroom'.

History broadens the children's minds and knowledge of how people used to live in the past. Our approach to History allows children to compare their lives with lives of the past; building opinions and interests on their discoveries.





The Foundation Stage

In the Foundation Stage we investigate the topic of History through the specific area of learning 'Understanding the World'.

Within this area the children focus on their own personal history. For example, remembering and discussing significant events in their lifetimes. Children are encouraged to share information about family routines and customs they have enjoyed. This approach to investigating History in the Foundation Stage encourages the development of the children's speaking and listening skills.

Discussions about our own history has led to topics such as birthdays, holidays and festivals. The children are always excited to share their experiences and knowledge with their peers and staff.



Key Stage One

In Key Stage One the children cover various aspects of History including local history, significant individuals, similarities and differences and comparing and contrasting historical events.

Through historical enquiry the children develop their questioning and reasoning skills. This is achieved by using sources such as artefacts, and photographs to enquire about historical events beyond living memory.

In addition, the children look at the chronological order of events from different time periods, giving them an understanding of continuity and change.
